



21 Questions You Should Definitely Ask Your Hiring Manager

General background

- 1. Why are you hiring for this role?
- 2. Do you have any profiles from great past hires? Any profiles to avoid?

Compensation, benefits, and pitch

- 3. What is the salary range for this position? How flexible is it?
- 4. Are any additional benefits or perks related to this position beyond the standard employee benefits package (such as a sales bonus)?
- 5. What is the career path for this position?
- 6. How would you pitch this opportunity to a candidate?

Team

- 7. What is the current team structure, and to whom will the new hire report?
- 8. Will the new hire be responsible for managing other employees?
- 9. How does this role relate to other departments within the organization?

Position

- 10. What are the primary job duties for the new hire? What's the approximate time breakdown for these responsibilities?
- 11. What are the top three ways the new hire will contribute to the company in the first 30 to 90 days? What are your expectations of them?

Requirements

- 12. What qualifications are required for candidates (such as technical skills, project experience, or certifications)?
- 13. What are some preferred but not required skills for candidates, and why (such as retail experience or knowledge of a programming language)?
- 14. Is industry experience necessary for this role, and why or why not?
- 15. What software proficiency is expected of the new hire?
- 16. What are the dealbreakers for this position, and why?

Location and work mode

- 17. What is the schedule for this position?
- 18. What's the remote/office work policy?

Hiring process

- 19. When is the ideal start date for the new hire?
- 20. What is the hiring process, and how will candidates be assessed?
- 21. Will candidates be required to complete a written assignment or a project as part of the process?
